Junior stars shine at European Championships for individuals and teams

The 2010 European junior individual and team champions have been crowned after a frenetic three-week period during which Tennis Europe's flagship summer events took place. A total of 178 national teams - and over seven hundred players – were in action across four age categories.

The events were highlighted by Europe's topranked 16 & Under player, Mathias Bourgue of France, who completed the unique feat of winning the three major Tennis Europe championships in the same year, and also witnessed some exceptional performances from Slovakia's girls, who accounted for four of the six possible final spots at the European Championships.

Anchored by junior world #1 Marton Fucsovics, Hungary wrapped up their first ever boys' European Summer Cups title at the 18 & Under finals in Venice. A total of twelve 16 & Under teams qualified for next month's finals of the Junior Davis and Fed Cup by BNP Paribas, while at the Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD, the champions of the first ever edition four years ago, Russia and France, reclaimed their positions as Europe's best 12 & Under teams.

Summing up the competitions, Tennis Europe President Jacques Dupré said "The past few weeks have seen some wonderful efforts from the tour's players, not to mention the many coaches who have accompanied them on their travels. I'd like to extend our thanks to all of the organisers from the 39 venues across the continent who have worked so hard to ensure that these events retain their place at the heart of the Tennis Europe Junior Tour, where they continue to showcase the talents of Europe's future stars."

European Junior Championships

The European Junior Championships is the most coveted prize on the Tennis Europe Junior Tour. with a massive 250 ranking points on offer as well as the chance to follow in the footsteps of the nine former world #1s to figure amongst the previous champions of the event.

The tournament was once again held at three venues across Europe, with the Under 14s travelling to Pilzen. Czech Republic. the Under 16s to Russia's National Tennis Centre in Moscow, and the Under 18s returning to the Swiss resort of Klosters for the first time in four years.

14 & Under: Quinzi continues golden spell

Top seed Gianluigi Quinzi beat his compatriot Filippo Baldi 6-1 6-2 in the first ever all-Italian final at the boys' 14 & Under event. After a nail biting opening match against Arkadijs Slobodkins (LTU) in which he was stretched to a final set tie break. Quinzi was in dominant form throughout the week, winning the rest of his matches in straight sets in a run that included victories over three seeded players and increased his winning streak to 13 Tennis Europe Junior Tour matches.

The win marks a 12th Tennis Europe Junior Tour title for Quinzi, who exploded onto the 12 & Under circuit in 2008, leading the Italian team to a first Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD title and capturing three titles on the Under 12 Tour as well as three on the Under 14 Tour. So far this year, the European #1 has also won the Category 1 event in Paris as well as securing his first Under 16 title, in Ankara, where he swept both singles and doubles crowns.

Quinzi becomes just the second Italian player ever to win the boys 14 & Under title, and came just short of achieving a rare double, having also paired up with Baldi to reach the doubles final. Despite their experience as a doubles team, Phillip Gresk and Kamil Majchrzak outlasted them in the deciding match. The pair fought back from a set down to outlast the Italians - who were both playing in their second match of the day - 3-6 6-4 10-6, becoming the first Polish players to win the 14 & Under title in 16

In the girls event, Indy De Vroome capped a dream week by upsetting fifth seeded home hope Katerina Siniakova 6-3 6-3 to win her first ever European Championship title. Unseeded De Vroome had a tough path to the final, single-handedly accounting for five of the tournament's sixteen seeds, including European #1 Ksenia Sharifova in the quarterfinals.

De Vroome was playing in just her second event of the season on the 14 & Under circuit, having finished as runner-up in Tarbes in January, and is the fourth Dutch girl to win the title in recent years, following in the footsteps of Michaella Krajicek (2002), Renee Reinhard (2004) and Richel Hogenkamp (2006).

The girls doubles title went to Estelle Cascino and Laura Tanfin of France. The pair beat Austrians Julia Grabher & Barbara Haas 6-3 6-3 to become just the second French pair ever to win the girls 14 & Under title.

European Junior Championships



16 & Under: Landmark achievement for French #1

Mathias Bourgue and Silvia Garcia Jimenez were crowned as European 16 & Under Champions on the final day of the event in Moscow. Garcia Jimenez was a surprise winner of the girls' event. Prior to the tournament, the Spanish 15-year old did not have a Tennis Europe Junior Tour ranking, but she made a mockery of her unseeded status, upsetting three seeded players during the seven-match win streak, which included a win over #2 Leolia Jeanjean in the second round.

In the final, she beat Slovak sixth seed Anna Karolina Schmiedlova 7-5 7-6(3) to secure her first title on the Tour, and becomes the third Spanish winner of the 16 & Under title, following in the footsteps of Arantxa Sanchez Vicario (1986) and Lourdes Dominguez Lino (1997).

Schmiedlova also reached the doubles final with compatriot Natalia Vajdova, but fell to Elke Lemmens & Elise Mertens, who recovered to beat the Slovaks in a match tie-break, 4-6 6-2 10-3. The win marked the first doubles title for Belgium at the European Championships since future world #1s Justine Henin and Kim Clijsters teamed up in 1996.

Meanwhile, top seed Mathias Bourgue won an all-French final in the boys' event with a 6-47-5 win over Gregoire Barrere. Having lost just one set in his six matches (to Filip Veger of Croatia in the quarter finals), Bourgue becomes the first French winner of the 16 & Under event since Jo-Wilfried Tsonga in 2001 and strengthens his already firm grip on the European #1 ranking.

Bourgue also joins a select band of players to have won all three major championships, the European Junior Championships plus the indoor and outdoor team championships, the Tennis Europe Winter Cups by HEAD and a European Summer Cup. It is the first time in nine years – and only the second time ever - that a player has held all three titles at

once. In 2002, Tomeu Salva of Spain teamed with Rafael Nadal and Marcel Granollers to claim both team championships, was crowned as European Junior Champion, and then achieved the unique feat of adding the European Junior Doubles title (with Granollers).

The boys' doubles final saw fourth seeds Vasco Mensurado & Federico Silva of Portugal edge past Britain's Luke Bambridge & Kyle Edmund 7-6(4) 6-4. The win is a second consecutive European Junior doubles title for Silva, who won the 14 & Under event last year with Gonçalo Loureiro.

18 & Under: Double Success for Slovakia

Slovakia's Jana Cepelová bettered her compatriot Schmiedlova's feat of reaching two finals by scooping both titles at the 18 & Under event in Klosters.

Cepelová's win was a testament to her fitness. Heavy rain had earlier disrupted the girls' tournament, meaning that the two finalists were forced to complete two matches on Saturday. Both semi finals turned out to be marathon encounters, with Cepelová's 35-game win over Maria Joao Koehler (POR) proving to be the longest match of the tournament.

Aware that she would also have to play in both finals on Sunday, the Slovak was in dominant mood in the singles final, racing to a 6-2 6-3 win over unseeded Spaniard Lara Arruabarrena Vecino. Cepelová then capped an unforgettable week by becoming the only player in 2010 to walk away with singles and doubles titles at the European Junior Championships, teaming with Chantal Skamlová for a second doubles title of the season, following on from their Australian Open triumph in January. The win represents a second consecutive >>

<< European title for Skamlová, who won the 16 & Under event last year.

Discussing her win, Cepelová said "I prepared myself for the tournament very well and then when I was once there, I played my best tennis. I certainly consider it as my greatest achievement yet, because I won both the singles and doubles. I hope it won't remain the only one, and that I will be able to add some more titles, also on the professional circuits. With every match played in Klosters, I was psychologically more resistant and believed in myself more."

In the boys' final, third seed Damir Dzumhur put in a controlled performance to end the giant-killing run of Spain's Andres Artunedo Martinavarr 6-1 6-3 The current junior world #8, Dzumhur lost just one set on route to the title, and is the first player from Bosnia & Herzegovina ever to win a European Junior Championship.

Artunedo also featured in the doubles final alongside compatriot Roberto Carballes, but the pair were beaten decisively by 8th seeded Russians Mikhail Biryukov and Richard Muzaev 6-2 6-2. Biryukov becomes the third player this year to have secured a second European doubles title, having won the 14 & Under event four years ago.

16 & Under European Summer Cups

Russia and France once again underlined their dominance in Europe's junior team competitions, with the two nations defending their 16 & Under girls' and boys' titles respectively.

At the Helvetie Cup finals in Leysin (SUI), Russia took an early lead against Ukraine in the final when Margarita Gasparyan beat Kateryna Kozlova 6-4 7-6(2) in the singles match between the #2 players of each team.

Reigning Roland Garros junior champion Elina Svitolina then levelled the tie with a 7-5 6-1 win over Daria Gavrilova, who was playing in the final for a second consecutive year. The Russians had the upper hand when the four players returned to the court for the deciding doubles match, securing their title defence with a 7-6(7) 6-3 win.

The win marks the third European Summer Cups victory in this age category for Russia (following on from 2004 and 2009), although teams from the Soviet Union also triumphed three times (1982-83, 1990).

With a strong team that featured recently crowned European champion Mathias Bourgue (who also anchored the team to victory in 2009) plus runner-up Gregoire Barrere as well as European #43 Laurent Lokoli, top seeded France raced through to the finals, winning all three ties without the loss of a match.

On the final day, Barrere brushed past Kyle Edmund in under 50 minutes, losing just one game. Bourgue then settled the tie with a 7-6(2) 6-3 win over Luke Bambridge before returning to the court to team with

Lokoli to secure a 3-0 sweep with a 7-5 6-1 doubles win over Bambridge & Edmund.

The win extends France's record as the most successful country in the history of the Borotra Cup, with 9 titles in total. Mathias Bourgue also scored the rare distinction of holding all three Tennis Europe flagship competitions at once in the same age category – the European Junior Championships, Tennis Europe Winter Cups by HEAD and European Summer Cup.

18 & Under European Summer Cups

At the finals of the Galea/Valerio Cup in Venice (ITA), Hungary beat Slovakia 2-0 to claim their first ever boys' European Summer Cups title.

Unseeded Hungary had caused several surprises on route to the final, blasting past second seeds Spain 3-0 on the first day before edging past Germany in a thrilling semi final.

They carried their good form into the final match with Slovakia, as Mate Zsiga demolished last year's European 16 & Under champion Filip Horansky 6-1 6-1 to give a 1-0 lead in the best of three match final. Jozef Kovalik looked as though he might level up for the Slovaks after taking a one set lead, but the current world junior #1 Marton Fucsovics used his experience to claw back a 1-6 6-3 6-2 win to add the European Summer Cups title to his junior Wimbledon title.

In the battle for third and fourth place, Germany beat Poland 2-1.

Over in Granville (FRA), Italy beat Spain 2-1 to claim the Soisbault/Reina Cup for the first time in 15 years on a thrilling final day of compeition.

Both teams had scored a pair of upsets to reach the final. Italy had relied on deciding doubles rubbers to get past France and top seeds Czech Republic, while Spain beat Russia 2-1 before ousting second seeds Romania 3-0 in their semi final.

Italy once again had to come from behind on the final day, after Garbine Muguruza Blanco beat Martina Caregaro 6-2 6-1 in the opening match. Italian #1 Nastassja Burnett levelled the tie with a 7-6(3) 6-1 win

over Maria Teresa Torro Flor, setting the stage for yet another deciding doubles match.

Both teams called on their rested players and Caregaro was joined by Valentine Confalonieri while Torro Flor teamed up with Lara Arruabarrena Vecino. After splitting the first two sets 7-5, the Italians scored a crucial early break in the decider, holding on for a 7-5 5-7 6-3 win to seal Italy's sixth Soisbault/Reina Cup.

Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD

The qualifying phase of the fourth edition of Europe's team competition for Under 12s, the Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD, attracted entries from 63 national teams, each of whom fought valiantly for places at the final rounds in either

Ajaccio, France (girls) or Alghero, Italy (boys).

In the boys competition, France went one better than last year's runner-up spot to clinch the title, but they had to survive a fight back from Russia on the final day.

The two teams were even after the singles matches with Olivier Wolfgang putting the French ahead with a 6-3 6-0 win over Arten Dubrivnyy, before Dmitry Shatalin levelled the tie with an equally authoritative 6-3 6-1 defeat of Geoffrey Blancaneaux in a match between two of the most successful players of the season so far on the 12 & Under Tennis Europe Junior Tour.

After a rest, the four players returned to the court for the deciding doubles match. The French pair almost let a match-winning lead slip in the second set but rallied to win 6-2 6-7(3) 6-3 and wrap up the title for the second time.

At the girl's finals in Ajaccio, Russia also won their second title at the event, brushing past two-time defending champions Ukraine.

In a reversal of last year's final result, Russia took the lead thanks to a 6-4 7-6(3) win for Yulia Bryzgalova over Stephanie Light Deh. Aleksandra Pospelova then sealed the trophy with a tenacious win, coming from a

set down to outlast Olga Fridman 4-6 7-5 6-0 in just under two and half hours of play. The Russians then added the dead doubles match to complete a 3-0 win as Sofya Zhuk joined Bryzgalova for a 7-5 6-4 win over Light Deh and Natalya Malenko.

Both Russia and Ukraine now have two girls' titles each from the four editions of Europe's Under 12 team championships.

14 & Under ITF/Tennis Europe Touring Team

The ITF/Tennis Europe 14 & Under Team recently completed a successful month-long tour of some of Europe's most prestigious events. Supported by the Grand Slam Development Fund, the team consisted of eight of the most promising players from the ITF/Tennis Europe Development Championships, which were held in Turkey earlier this year.

Devised to assist less developed nations with the costs of sending their players to compete in the best events on a regular basis, the Tour began on 1st July with a three-day training camp in Paris, where the team members were able to get to know their coaches Rudi Visser (NED) and Conor O Callaghan (IRL), who put the players through their paces with some specific match play training including physical, technical, tactical and mental work.

This year's team consisted of four girls - Viktoriya Lushkova (UKR), Jelena Ostapenko (LAT), Damira Muminovic (BIH) and Dea Herdzelas (BIH), and four boys - Alexandar Lebedyn (UKR), Anton Khyzchin (UKR), Arkadijs Slobodkins (LAT) and Mantas Bugailiskis (LTU).

Following the training camp, players moved on to the first tournament on the 'Young Stars' series of consecutive Category 1 events, the BNP Paribas Cup in Paris. Damira Muminovic scored a great win over top seed Ksenija Sharifova (RUS) in the quarterfinals 6-3 7-6. She went on to meet teammate Viktoriya Lushkova in the final, where the Ukrainian was victorious in a tight match 5-7 6-3 6-4. Lushkova & Jelena Ostapenko also reached the semis of the doubles. Alexander Lebedyn also had a great week, beating Andre Biro 3-6 6-4 6-2 to reach the semi final, where he lost narrowly to Quentin Halys 1-6 7-6 6-1. Mantas Bugailiskis & Anton Khyzchin reached the quarters of the doubles, losing to Chessari & Gresk 6-1 6-3.

The players then moved on to another successful week at the **Windmill Cup** in Leeuwarden. Jelena Ostapenko and Dea Herdzelas both posted upsets to advance to the semi finals. Lushkova & Ostapenko went on to win the doubles in convincing fashion, beating the pair they had lost to the previous week, Li & Ye of China, 7-5 6-2. Slobodkins & Bugiliskis also reached the semi finals of the boys doubles beating the top-seeded Australians Kokkinakis & Tu 6-4 7-5 on the way. Anton Khyzchin reached the singles quarterfinals before losing to Elias Ymer 6-4 4-6 6-3.

This year all of the players represented their countries at the **European Championships**, the third stop on the tour. The team members successfully negotiated their way through the early rounds with some notable performances. Viktoriya Lushkova reached the quar-

terfinals accounting for promising players such as Sara Sorribes Tormo (ESP) and Belinda Bencic (SUI), before eventually losing to Estelle Cascino (FRA) 6-4 6-1. The other girls on the team all won multiple matches to reach the fourth round. Alexandar Lebedyn also got as far as the quarterfinals, defeating teammate Mantas Bugailiskis in the second round. He went on to play 7th-seed Quentin Halys but was forced to retire with an injury at the beginning of the third set, and was unable to play at the following event in Cologne as a result. Arkadijs Slobodkins gave the #1 seed and eventual winner Gianluigi Quinzi (ITA) a real scare in his opening match, losing a tremendous battle 6-4 4-6 7-6. Anton Khyzchin also reached the third round before losing to seeded Martin Blasko 6-3 6-1.

The Jungsten Cup in Cologne, Germany was the final port of call, where Viktoriya Lushkova again led the way, beating team-mate Ostapenko in the semi finals before clinching the title when Sandra Matekova was forced to quit with an injury after losing the first set. Ostapenko & Lushkova teamed up to take their second doubles title of the tour. On the boys' side, Arkiadijs Slobodkins lost to COSAT team member Romai Ugarte (CHI), but reached the final of the consolation event, where he lost narrowly to Seong Chan Hong. Anton Khychin had his best week of the tour, reaching the semi finals of both the singles and the doubles, bowing out to the much talked-about German Johannes Haerteis in both events.

ITF/Tennis Europe Development Officer Hrvoje Zmajic commented, "The Touring Teams play a hugely important role in assisting the development of the most promising juniors from the countries benefiting from the ITF/Tennis Europe Development Programme. Once again, we have seen the players take full advantage of the opportunity, and all have made significant progress in recent weeks. On behalf of the ITF and Tennis Europe, and also the players concerned, I'd like to thank the coaches Conor and Rudi for their excellent work with the teams."

Senior Circuit Round-Up

European Mens Club Championships

New champions were crowned at the Men's 60 & Over European Senior Club Championships in Salzburg, Austria, where TC Lese Grün Weiss Köln beat the defending champions, TC Wolfsburg Pforzheim 4-1 in the final.

Pforzheim had looked strong favourites to win after coming through the round robin stage with a perfect 15-0 match record, and took an early lead in the final as Larry Turville beat Jorge Camina Borda 7-6 6-0 in the first match, a battle between the second and third ranked players in the world in this age group. The second rubber proved crucial, with Tadeausz Nowicki recovering from a set down to upset world #4 Julio Lavagno 2-6 6-2 7-6(4) to level the tie, after which Kóln won all three remaining matches to secure their first European title.

The Men's 65 & Over event in Rakovnik (CZE) saw Circolo Tennis Palermo defend their title with a 3-0 win over Rot-Weiss Berlin. The two clubs have now met in the final for four consecutive years, with CT Palermo coming out on top each time, though this was their easiest win so far

Giorgio Enio put the Italian club ahead with a 6-3 6-1 win over Bernd Reinholz in the opening match. World #1 Peter Adrigan extended the lead with a 7-5 6-2 win over Eberhard Madelsperger before world #3 Peter Pokorny settled the tie with a 6-4 6-2 victory over Harald Elschenbroich. The remaining doubles matches were not played.

Palermo's fourth win overall extends their position as the winningest team in the history of the championship.

The remaining Club Championship events for men and women are scheduled to take place in September.

European Outdoor Senior Championships (35+)

German players swept all titles at the 35 & Over European Senior Championships, which were held in Rottach Weissach, Germany from 22-25 July.

Susi Fortun-Lohrmann was a decisive winner of the women's event, losing just three games in three matches on her way to the title, all of them coming in the final match against Helena Vildova of the Czech Republic. Fortun-Lohrmann then teamed up with Caroline Schneider to take the doubles title with a 6-0.

6-0 win over Karin Bornholdt & Susanne Fleischfresser.

Third seed Gerhard Fahlke won an all-German battle in the mens final, racing away after a tight first set against top seed Thassilo Haun to win 7-6(2) 6-2. Fahlke accounted for both of the higher ranked players in the draw, overcoming #2 Benjamin Budziak (POL) in the semi final.

Fahlke and Haun then teamed up to add the doubles title, with a 6-1 6-3 win over Simon Bramwell (GBR) & Michael Czernich (GER).

European Beach Tennis Championships Preview



The fourth edition of the European Beach Tennis Championships are set to take place at Club Ali Bey in Antalya, Turkey September 10-12.

A record number of 18 nations have entered the event, which

will include men's, women's and mixed doubles competitions. Teams from Turkey (whose team features WTA star lpek Senoglu) and France will all be taking part at the event for the first time.

Italian teams have swept the board at previous editions of the event, and once again look to be hot favourites with the world's top ranked pairs Luca Meliconi & Alan Maldini and Federica Bacchetta & Giulia Spazzoli, as well as former champions Laura Olivieri & Simona Briganti amongst their squad.

European Coaches Symposium

The 7th European Universities Tennis Championships were held in Coimbra, Portugal from July 25 - 31.

A team competition open to the winners of the National University Tennis Championships, the event is organised by the European University Sport Association (www.eusa.eu) and this year saw participation from a record 34 universities from 16 countries.

The men's event was won by Kozminski University of Poland, who beat the University of Zagreb 2-1, while Universitaire Leonardo da Vinci of France beat last year's runners-up MESI Moscow into second place once again to take the women's title.



Beyond the Baseline...

Following a successful World Team Tennis season, former world #1 Lindsay Davenport returned to the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour for the first time since the birth of her second child by partnering Liezel Huber to victory in Stanford for her 38th career doubles title. The win also saw Huber reclaim the #1 spot from the Williams sisters

Bob and Mike Bryan also made doubles history recently, capturing a 63rd ATP World Tour title. breaking the record of Todd Woodbridge and Mark Woodforde for most titles as a team.

Juan Martín del Potro has resumed training after spending more than six months on the sidelines due to wrist surgery. It is unlikely that the Argentine US Open champion will return to the circuit before the Davis Cup semi finals in September.

The coaching carousel continues: Roger Federer has announced that he will work with Paul Annacone on a trial basis, while Andy Murray is currently coachless following his split from Miles Maclagan. Svetlana Kuznetsova has been working with Amélie Mauresmo's former coach Loïc Courteau

Jelena Dokic has returned to the Top 100 after winning three consecutive ITF Women's Circuit events in Contrexeville, Bucharest and Vancouver, and has confirmed that she is working with Glen Schaap, former coach to Nadia Petrova and Dinara Safina.

Spanish veteran Alberto Martín has announced his retirement with immediate effect.

Ivan LendI has confirmed a return to tennis after a 16-year break when he participates at the Jean Luc Largardere Trophy ATP Champions Tour event in Paris from 1-3 October. Yannick Noah will also make a return to the seniors tour at the event, with Mats Wilander also confirmed.

Amongst the players to commit to the curtain raising event of the 2011 season, the mixed Hopman Cup team event in Perth. are Justine Henin & Steve Darcis for Belgium, Novak Djokovic & Ana Ivanovic for Serbia, Gael Monfils & Kristina Mladenovic for France

and Serena Williams & John Isner for the USA.

TK Radofzell clinched the German women's Bundesliga title last week. Amongst the players to turn out for the club in recent weeks were Sybille Bammer, Sesil Karatantcheva, Angelique Kerber and Tatiana Malek.

The **Davidoff Swiss Indoors** in Basel will have a new title sponsor in 2011 following the introduction of new international restrictions on the advertising of tobacco.

World #1 and #2 Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic teamed up to play doubles at this week's ATP Masters 1000 event in Toronto, the first time in 34 vears that the top two-ranked singles players had played doubles together. Their tournament was short lived though, with the pair losing to Canadian wild cards Pospisil and Raonic 5-7 6-3 10-8 in the first round. Both players have also confirmed that they will play the event - in singles - in Bangkok later this year.

Iva Majoli and Martina Hingis will play a repeat of the 1997 Roland Garros final in which the Croatian won her sole Grand Slam singles title on September 8 in Hvar, in aid of charity. Hingis has also confirmed her participation at the inaugural Marbella Masters in Spain, set to take place from September 17 - 19, alongside Sergi Bruguera, Richard Krajicek, Younes El Aynaoui, Pat Cash, Jeremy Bates and Mansour Bahrami.

After a successful first edition last week won by home favourite Caroline Wozniacki, the e-Boks Sony Ericsson Open in Copenhagen will shift its calendar spot next year to be played the week after Roland Garros.



With most of the top male players enjoying summer breaks after Wimbledon, there are no changes to the European Top Ten this month. Of the entire Top Ten, only Andy Murray has slightly increased his points total in the weeks since the year's third Grand Slam event.

The women's list sees a few changes as the first of the first tournaments of the North American hardcourt season bring about a revival in fortunes for some established stars. Victoria Azarenka won the Stanford event with victories over several top players, bouncing one of them - defending champion Marion Bartoli - out of the Top Ten as a result.

The following week Svetlana Kuznetsova returned to the winners' circle for the first time in almost year with victory in San Diego. The Russian also makes it back into Europe's Top Ten, having dropped out last month for the first time since winning her maiden Grand Slam title six years ago.
