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ALIZÉ CORNET SWEEPS EUROPEAN JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS



The final remaining unsettled category of the European Junior Championships – the Girls 16 & Under event – was settled this weekend as Alizé Cornet (pictured) of France produced some impressive performances to win both singles and doubles at the event, staged for the first time this year at the Olympic Tennis Complex in Athens, Greece.

Although Cornet became the first French winner in over 25 years, she was not the only French girl to make waves at the championships. Doubles partner Estelle Guisard produced the upset of the week as she outlasted the top seeded current Junior Masters champion, Alexandra Dulgheru (ROM) in three sets in the round of the last 16. Seeded thirteenth, Guisard proceeded to the semi finals, where she was accounted for by Spain's Maite Gabarrus, the current European Junior Tour #1, in a close straight set match.

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Upsets were more frequent in the bottom half of the draw, where most of Cornet's projected seeded opponents were removed from her path at the earliest stages. Fourth-seeded Romanian Ioana Ivan and sixth-seeded Spaniard Leticia Costas were the biggest names to be upset, losing their first and second matches respectively.

Cornet herself was rarely troubled, winning all six of her matches in straight sets, including the final with Gabarrus. After sealing the win in just over an hour and a quarter, Cornet immediately sought out her mobile to call her parents in France, before climbing into the seating area to embrace her coach.

Whilst waiting to receive her second gold medal of the event from Tennis Europe Junior Committee representative Todor Todorov and Hellenic Tennis Federation President Spyros Zannias, Cornet commented: "I will always remember Athens getting two gold medals and being able to play on the centre court where last year my idol [Amelie Mauresmo]"

Gabarrus was philosophical about her loss, which was largely due to an uncharacteristic amount of unforced errors. "I did not play goodE" she remarked. "I was still very tired from the semi final. I will take lots of happy memories from Athens and from the organisation, but I'd like to forget the final as quickly as possible!"

The previous day, Cornet and Guisard had secured the doubles title with a 62 63 win over surprise finalists Elena Chernyakova and Yulia Solonitskaya of Russia. The girls explained the joy at winning, "It's a very special

moment for us because we were French champions, but now we can say that we are European Championships. We both worked hard for the win."

The closing ceremony of the event was highlighted by a spectacular gymnastics show from that ThrakoMakedones Gymnastics club in Athens.

RUSSIA WIN SECOND CONSECUTIVE FED CUP TITLE

Russia have defended their Fed Cup title, beating France in the final round for the second year.

The singles were split 2-2 as the crowd enjoyed some particularly high quality tennis, in particular from Russian #1 Elena Dementieva, who was determined not to succumb to defeat against Mary Pierce, who had eliminated her from the US Open only a week previously. The battle between the last two Roland Garros finalists was again a close match, however Dementieva kept the intensity this time and raised her game at all the right moments, ending a 76(1) 26 61 winner.

Amelie Mauresmo and Anastasia Myskina followed, and played a tentative match with Myskina in particular seeming out of sorts. The only straightforward match of

the tie, Mauresmo quickly evened things up for the home team, losing just six games against the 2004 Roland Garros champion.

Saturday's matches were even more competitive, with all three battles going to a deciding set. Dementieva was once again the tougher player as she edged Mauresmo in a high quality match until errors began to creep into the French woman's game towards the end of the final set.

The 64 46 62 scoreline of the match was repeated exactly in the fourth singles match, as Myskina had the chance to seal a third rubber for Russia. Beginning strongly, Myskina took the first set with a much more...

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...consistent display than the error-strewn show of the previous day. Pierce, however was not to be denied, and her greater determination during the second set paid off, as more and more of her shots found their way on to the lines. Myskina's level began to fall, along with her confidence, whilst Pierce seemed to grow in stature the better she played. The players were no match for each other in the third set, as Pierce cruised to a 6-2 win, setting the stage for a dramatic doubles show-down.

Three of the four singles players returned to the court for the doubles match, with only Myskina being replaced, by Dinara Safina, whose greater commitment to doubles week in week out on the tour arguably made the difference amongst the four. The Russians edged a first set in which both teams struggled to hold serve, but it seemed that Pierce and Mauresmo had turned the tide, winning a very one-sided

second set 6-1. With the partisan crowd going wild in the stands, the momentum began to swing once again, and after a scrappy early part of the set, the Russian team once again were the driving force, with Safina's inspired poaching at the net unsettling the home team.

With Russia now having won the Fed Cup at home and away, they'll be eager in their quest to become the first team to win the trophy for three consecutive years since Spain did so from 1993-1995.

Prior to the final it was announced that Françoise Dürr would be this years honorary recipient of the Fed Cup Award of Excellence. Presented by ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti and French Tennis Federation President Christian Bîmes.

CLIJSTERS AND FEDERER MAKE IT A EUROPEAN DOUBLE IN NEW YORK

European players swept the singles titles at the US Open for the second consecutive year, as Roger Federer defended a Grand Slam title for the second time this summer, while Kim Clijsters finally shook off a run of four final defeats to lift a Grand Slam trophy for the first time.

Federer's final round meeting with Andre Agassi had been hotly anticipated from the start of the second week. In reaching the final, the popular American had rolled back the years to win a succession of gruelling five-set matches, including a memorable comeback from two sets and a break down against a resurgent James Blake. In contrast Federer had lost just two sets, and started the final in a manner to suggest he would not be losing any more. With Agassi matching the world #1 stroke for stroke in a stunning second set, errors began to creep in to the Swiss players' game. Playing his best tennis in years, Agassi captured the second set 6-2 and moved a break ahead in the third. Unfazed, Federer recovered almost immediately, going on to force a tie break in which he reproduced the form he had shown the previous day (raising his game after an extremely close set to maul Lleyton Hewitt 7-0), this time conceding just one point to the American. From there it was plain sailing, and the Swiss star broke twice in the fourth to seal a 64 26 76 61 victory.

A number of other European players recorded career best performances at the Open, not least the Finnish #1 Jarkko Nieminen, who became the first player from Finland ever to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal, where Hewitt edged him in five sets.

Like Federer, Clijsters had arrived in Flushing Meadows as the red-hot favourite for the title after compiling an incredible record on hard courts since her return from a career-threatening wrist injury in the spring. Since February she had lost only one match on North American soil, accumulating titles in Indian Wells and Miami early

in the year before returning after Wimbledon to sweep events in Stanford, Los Angeles and Toronto.

From the earliest exchanges it was clear that Clijsters had no intention of playing in the tentative, inhibited style that she had shown two years previously when she lost the final in New York to her compatriot Justine Henin-Hardenne. Pierce, whose fierce drives and deep corner-to-corner groundstrokes had been too powerful for earlier opponents, was frequently

forced to take defensive positions while the Belgian wasted no chances to wrest the initiative. After two thrilling semi finals, in which Clijsters overcame a remarkable second-set fight-back from Maria Sharapova (who saved five match points before capitulating in the decider), and Pierce upset the 2004 finalist Elena Dementieva amid controversy over her use of injury time-outs, the 63 61 scoreline was something of an anti-climax to the tournament. Pierce was particularly sorry to have lost, later

hinting that she may have retired if she had won, and joined Lindsay Davenport in the dubious distinction of having lost two Grand Slam finals in 2005.

Clijsters' immediate future looks rosier. Having been ranked outside the top 100 after the Australian Open, her meteoric rise has taken her to third, and with virtually nothing to defend for the rest of the year, a return to the top spot looks inevitable, although this time there will be no critics to comment that she needs a Grand Slam to truly merit such an accolade.

In the doubles event, there was more disappointment in store for Dementieva, as she teamed with Flavia Pennetta (ITA) to make an impressive run to the final. They produced a good fightback from 4-0 down in the second set, but Samantha Stosur (AUS) and Lisa Raymond (USA) eventually overcame nerves to earn a 62 57 63 win - a first and eighth Grand Slam title respectively for the pair.

The Bryan brothers also managed to ensure that home players would leave with some of the silverware, capturing the doubles title with a comprehensive win over top seeds Jonas Bjorkman (SWE) and Max Mirnyi (BLR). It was the fourth Grand Slam final of the year for the pair, who were relieved to have avoided what they had dubbed the "anti-slam", and to have finally added to their Roland Garros title of 2003.

With a victory in the mixed doubles event, Daniela Hantuchova (SVK) achieved the rare feat of having won the title at all four Grand Slam events during her career. In New York she partnered Mahesh Bhupathi of India to beat Katerina Srebotnik (SLO) and Nenad Zimonjic (SCG). It was the second mixed doubles slam of the year for Bhupathi, who also won at Wimbledon.

Top-seeded Viktoria Azarenka of Belarus picked up a second Junior Grand Slam title - adding to this year's Australian Open - with a straight sets defeat of American Alexa Glatch. Glatch also reached the doubles final, where she and compatriot Vania King lost a tight two-set match to Nikola Frankova (CZE) and Alissa Kleybanova (RUS).

The boys singles event featured a number of upsets, with only one of the top four seeds surviving past the quarter finals. Seventh seed Jeremy Chardy (FRA) was responsible for two of them, defeating Roland Garros champion Marin Cilic (CRO) in the last eight before accounting for Santiago Giraldo (COL) to set up a final with unseeded Ryan Sweeting of the Bahamas. Sweeting had also reached the final on the back of a string of upsets, ousting four seeds in his five matches on the way to becoming the first ever Bahaman Junior Slam winner.

As in the men's event, home pride was salvaged in the

boys doubles though, as the eighth seeded pair of Alex Clayton and Donald Young atoned for their early round losses in the singles event to edge Carsten Ball of Australia and European Junior Champion (Under 18) Thiemo De Bakker (NED) 76 46 75.



In a memorable final, Agassi drove the home crowd wild, but once again was outclassed by the world #1.

Further success for the Dutch came in the form of both Wheelchair Tennis singles titles as the NEC Wheelchair Tour came to Flushing Meadows for a first time. World #1 Esther Vergeer comfortably saw off compatriot Korie Homan 62 61, whilst Robin Ammerlaan lost only more game in a comprehensive

win over Michael Jeremiasz. Both sets of finalists then paired to win their respective doubles titles.

With the years' major titles now decided, attention turns to the indoor season and the fight to qualify for the year ending championships. In a year in which competition has been fierce, resulting in four different women and three different men's champions, we could see the unusual situation that Grand Slam title holders fail to qualify for the elite 8-player events.

SPORTS UNIVERSITY GAMES IN IZMIR

Edition 23 of the Sport University Games took place in Izmir, Turkey from 10 – 21 August 2005. The tennis competition was held at the new Ornekkoy (Karsiyaka) Tennis Centre, which boasts twelve outdoor and four indoor courts.

The unique character of the Games provides the opportunity for players of different levels to compete against each other; some are already playing on the professional tours, whilst others have preferred to concentrate on academic studies. In total, over 140 players from over forty countries competed in singles, doubles and mixed doubles events. The top seeded players were Korean Yoon Yeong Cho (who held a WTA ranking of #73 at the start of the event) and Wang Yeu Tzuoo from Taipei (ATP #122).

The top four seeds in the women's singles event reached the semifinals. Czech player Eva Hrdinova produced the best performance from a European player, despatching Su-Wei Hsein of Taipei 64 63 to set up a final with top seed Cho, who had needed three sets to progress yet another player from Taipei, Chan Chin Wei. Hrdinova dominated the final from the early stages and completed a 61 62 win for her first Universiade title.



European players were more prolific in the men's singles event, where two Russians progressed to the final. 12th seed Evgeny Kirillov upset the top seed 75 64 in the first semi to set up a match with seventh seed Aretm Sitak, a winner over Sebastien Kosak (FRA). Kirillov, the younger of the two, had the edge in the final which he won in straight sets, 64 76.

The competition was run under the guidance of Eichii Kawatei from Japan in the role of Head of the Technical Commission for tennis, along with Belgian referee Yves Freson. They were

ably assisted by 31 national umpires, 120 linesmen and more than 100 ball boys.

The ITF Technical Delegate at the Sport University Games, Hrvoje Zmajic commented: "The organizers provided excellent facilities, with a centre court worthy of the expectations of top professional tournaments. The University Games are very important as a means of popularising tennis between students and increasing tennis participation worldwide. The event continues to grow, and we are looking forward to more support from national tennis federations, as they include more and more quality players in their national teams in the future."

OBITUARY - JEREMY SHALES

Tennis Europe News is sad to report the death of Jeremy Shales, one of the best known officials in the game, who passed away this week after a short illness.

Although he had officiated at all four Grand Slams as well as many other events around the world, Mr. Shales will perhaps be best remembered for his commitment to the Wimbledon Championships, where he served for over 40 years.

Tennis Europe President John James paid the following tribute: "I was saddened to hear of the death of Jeremy. He was one of the characters in the world of tennis. He

was one of the great tennis officials, known all round the world. His achievements in umpiring from grass roots to the highest level in the world game will always be remembered. I worked with him before and during my time at the LTA. He was an enthusiast for sport, and in particular tennis. He will be greatly missed."

ITF/TENNIS EUROPE 14-16 & UNDER TOURING TEAMS FIND SUCCESS IN GERMANY

The ITF and Tennis Europe recently organised 14 & Under and 16 & Under Tours of Germany for the first time. Fifteen players from ten countries and four coaches were in attendance, starting with a 2-day training camp in Ulm, the site of the first of the tournaments, the LBS Müller Cup. The Team then proceeded to the Bavarian Junior Open in Echting and finished the three-week tour at the Mercedes-Benz Jugend Cup in Renningen-Rutesheim.

Radu Albot (MLD), Oksana Kalashnikova (GEO) and

Bojana Jovanovski (SCG) were the most successful players on the teams and all saw their rankings rise significantly as a result of their efforts.

Albot was particularly outstanding, picking up two singles titles at the boys 16 & under events in Ulm and Renningen/Rutesheim and teaming with compatriot Achim Ceban to claim the doubles titles at all three events.

In the girls' 16 & under category, Kalashnikova won the

event in Renningen/Rutesheim defeating the No. 1 seed, Elena Chernyakova (RUS) 46 64 76. Kalashnikova then joined forces with Hana Malakovich (BLR) to clinch the doubles title in three sets with a 63 16 75 win over Anna Maskaljun (EST) and Chernyakova.



In the girls' 14 & under category, Jovanovski defeated Hanna Orlik (BEL) 62 62 at the event in Ulm to take the girls' singles title and also made it to the doubles final with Ema Burgic (BIH). In the

boys' 14 & under category Stanislav Poplavsky (UKR) reached the semifinals in Renninger / Rutesheim where he lost to Marko Lenz (GER) 16 36.

ITF/Tennis Europe Team coach Ales Filipcic commented, "The standard of play from the team members was, as far as tennis is concerned, was of an excellent level throughout the whole tour. This tour has enabled the players and coaches to receive new ideas and knowledge which will be an invaluable tool in helping to improve their tennis game."

EUROPEAN JUNIOR MASTERS PREVIEW

As the junior tennis season draws to a close, Europe's top players are anxiously awaiting to see who will qualify for this year's Junior Masters event, scheduled to be held in Reggio Calabria, Italy, from the 7th to 9th of November.

Introduced in 1996, the championships represent the climax of the European Junior Tour season, bringing together the eight best-performing players in each age category.

First time champions will be crowned this year in each category, as last years winners have failed to qualify, or been eliminated by age ineligibility.

The event has historically been a reliable indicator of future success, with former champions including Kim Clijsters, Elena Bovina, Rafael Nadal and Tommy Robredo. An in-depth report will follow in the October edition of Tennis Europe News.

EUROPEAN RANKINGS

The North American hardcourt season has had some dramatic effects on the European rankings, in particular the women's list. Solid performances from Maria Sharapova enabled her to reach the world #1 position for the first time, and also to strengthen her hold at the top of the European list. A total of four hardcourt titles, including her first Grand Slam enable Kim Clijsters to position herself near the top of the standings, with a good chance of ending the year at #1.

Having reached two Grand Slam finals, Mary Pierce returns to the European top 5 for the first time in five

years. In contrast, the injury-troubled Svetlana Kuznetsova falls from third to ninth as a result of her inability to defend her US Open and Bali titles.

European players occupy the top three places of the ATP world rankings despite Rafael Nadal's early exit and Marat Safin's inability to play at the US Open. Consistent Stateside performances from David Ferrer push him into the role of #2 Spaniard for the first time in his career, as Tommy Robredo struggled to produce his 2004 hard-court form.

European Specific Theme Conference 2005

National Associations are reminded that this year's conference will be held in association with the German Tennis Federation in Cologne on the 2-3 December. Entry this year is restricted to one participant per nation (excluding speakers), who should ideally be the person in charge of their national coaches education programme.
