

JOHN JAMES TO SERVE SECOND TERM AS TENNIS EUROPE PRESIDENT

John James was re-elected President of Tennis Europe at the 30th Annual General Meeting, held in Malta and hosted by the Maltese Tennis Federation during the weekend of 15th-17th April. It is the second term for Mr. James, who has been involved with the organisation in varying roles since his 1981 appointment as Secretary of the Lawn Tennis Association of Great Britain.

Also at the Annual General Meeting, a new Committee of Management was elected. Six of the existing Committee members were returned to office by the delegates, who travelled from over thirty of Tennis Europe's member nations to attend the meeting. (continued on Page 2)

TENNIS EUROPE LAUNCHES EUROPEAN ONLINE TENNIS CALENDAR

Tennis Europe have launched a pan-European Tennis Calendar at <u>www.TennisEurope.org</u>. The consolidated calendar is the only one of its kind, and details every international tennis event held in Europe throughout the year, including information from every discipline of the sport—professional, junior, seniors and wheelchair tennis.

The printable calendar is searchable by date, country and organising body, enabling the user to view at a glance all events in Europe on a given week, to view the annual calendars of the various disciplines, or to view all international events scheduled in any of Tennis Europe's 48 member nations. Also detailed are the court surface and draw information from each event, along with a link to the tournament website. The calendar also lists upcoming trade fairs, exhibitions and conferences. INTERVIEW WITH THE PRESIDENT

Tennis Europe News caught up with John James just after his re-election as President to find out how he felt about his first three years in charge of the organisation, and his plans for the next.

You've been heavily involved with tennis for most of your life. What is it about the sport that captivates you?

From a very young age I was involved in tennis as my father was Secretary of our local tennis club and we lived within walking distance of it. My mother was also very active at the club and my uncle was the President of the annual tournament, which attracted large entries in the open, handicap and junior events. I have always loved sport, and in particular tennis, because of this background. Tennis is such an exciting game both to play and to watch. It is always compared to a game of chess. The beauty of the game is that you can play singles, doubles and mixed doubles. It is a very friendly game. The tennis club brings together all members of the community. It can be enjoyed at all skill levels and at all ages.

Your re-election was hugely popular with the delegates at the AGM. What is it about your character that enables you to fill your role as President so well?

I am very enthusiastic about the game. I believe my involvement as a player, court official, coach and administrator at club, county, national and international level has given me the experience necessary to fulfil the role.

What have been the biggest challenges for the organisation during your first three years as President?

Re-organisation and the preparation of a strategy for the future of Tennis Europe. We needed to move forward and to facilitate improved communication with and between our members.

As you begin another term at the helm, what do you see as the priorities for Tennis Europe over the next three years?

The two key words in our mission statement are "Europe" and "Tennis". We need to focus on ensuring that we deliver in key areas: development of the game in Europe; junior tennis, professional tennis and senior tennis; conference and events; the marketing of the game in Europe and continuing to provide services to our member nations. One area in particular that I wish to see promoted is wheelchair tennis, especially at junior level.

The newly elected Committee of Management reflects the diversity of European nations, with evenly distributed representatives from A, B and C-nations. What significance does this have for the organisation?

It was very satisfying to see so many people standing for our Committee of Management from all across Europe. You are right that the diversity of European nations is significant; it is one of our strengths and provides many opportunities. It is so important that there is a good relationship between our larger and longstanding member nations with our newly joined members.

One of the topics on the agenda at the AGM was that of the tennis industry in Europe. Why do you think er should attach such importance to this issue?

During the open session on the first day of the AGM we focused on how we could co-operate with the tennis industry in Europe in the promotion of the game. Cooperation between the USTA and Tennis Industry America has been very successful with joint programmes to promote the game at all levels. We consider that Tennis Europe could be a facilitator in the formation of a similar organisation.

European tennis had one of its strongest ever years in 2004, with seven of the eight Grand Slams, plus the Davis and Fed Cup titles. What do you think of some of the emerging tennis powers in Europe, and how much further can they go?

The game has always been very strong in Europe. We have always had an excellent tournament calendar from junior to senior level and top coaches. It does not surprise me that so many great players emerge from all across Europe. With such a good base there should always be a wealth of good players. How much further can they go? The sky's the limit!

TENNIS EUROPE CELEBRATES THIRTY YEARS IN BASEL

Tennis Europe has been based in Basel, Switzerland, since the founding of the organisation, thirty years ago this year. To mark the anniversary, Tennis Europe is participating in a number of events in the region throughout the year. The first of these occurred last weekend at the Tennis Festival Basel, a fund-raising event held at Tennis Club Old Boys.

The club, which recently celebrated it's 75th anniversary, holds the distinction of having the world's best player as one of it's members. Roger Federer, who has played at the club since childhood, was on hand to play a special exhibition match



against Swiss #5 Marco Chiudinelli. After the match, won by Federer 7-6 6-3, the Club honoured their best known patron by unveiling a plaque renaming the main court the 'Roger Federer Centre Court'.

Other activities at the event included a special 'Kid's Day', during which local children took the opportunity to watch Swiss Davis Cup players play practice matches before taking part in coaching clinics and other activities for kids.

Swiss Tennis took the opportunity to launch 'Kids Tennis', a scheme to aid in the training and development of young players which attempts to simplify the game by dividing the court in separate areas (or levels) which

EASTERN EUROPEAN COACHES WORKSHOP

The first Eastern European Coaches Workshop, organised by the ITF and Tennis Europe in conjunction with the Polish Coaches Symposium, was held at the University of Physical education in Poznan, Poland between the 15th and 18th April. The goal of the biannial event is to encourage coaches to share practical coaching knowledge with leading coaches from East European countries.

168 coaches from 12 countries attented the two-day event, which included presentations from Richard Schönborn (GER), Frantisek Zlesak (CZE), Kenneth Bastiaens (BEL), Torsten Salm (GER) and Piotr Unierzyski (POL). The workshop involved on-court and lecture room presentations from top international tennis experts, and included the floowing topics:

- The modern technique for the future
- Complex approach to tactics
- Training of advanced wheelchair tennis
- Usage of ITN in coach practical work
- Tuning of tennis racquets
- Psychology in everyday coaching
- Fitness on the tour
- Periodisation for professionals

The workshop also enabled coaches from East European countries to receive information about modern coaching methodology in order to improve the quality of coaching promising juniors and recreational players.

Piotr Unierzyski, director of the event, said "The Workshop provides an invaluable opportunity to gather coaches from the region and to help motivate them to work according to modern standards. Coaches attending the workshop showed not only great enthusaiasm but also incredible endurance for taking part in such an intense programme."

SLOVAKIAN TENNIS FEDERATION LAUNCHES ITN IN SLOVAK REPUBLIC

The Slovakian Tennis Federation has joined a growing number of nations which have opted to introduce the International Tennis Number ratings system. The ITN, which is devised as a universal method of rating a player's general level of play, will be introduced there in May 2005.

Ten future Slovakian assessors attended a workshop conducted by ITF/Tennis Europe Development Officer Hrvoje Zmajic in late April, during which they studied the benefits and opportunities of the ITN Programme. On court, the participants also went through the practical procedures of the ITN assessment.

This project is a part of an initiative to increase participation in tennis in Slovakia. The ITN provides a method of rating players' skill levels, enabling players to find ideal playing partners. It also promotes a variety of tennis competitions formats, facilitates the movement of all levels of players between countries and much more.

Vice President of the Slovakian Tennis Association Anton Litecky Sueda commented: "With the ITN we would like to encourage more people to start playing tennis and at the same time to link them to the Federation. As a first step, we would like to create a database of recreational players followed by organization of various events based on the ITN number."

ITF / TENNIS EUROPE DEVELOPMENT CHAMPIONSHIPS 2005

The 2005 Development Championships took place mid-March in Tallinn, Estonia. The two-week event is now in its eleventh year, and is designed to benefit the top players from some of Europe's less-developed tennis nations. Top performing players at the event receive travel grants to help towards the often prohibitive costs of travel to international junior tennis tournaments.

Hosted by the Estonian Tennis Association, the event took place in two stages from 11 to 20 March. Players from 17 Eastern European countries took part in two consecutive tournaments to ensure maximum playing benefits. Simona Halep of Romania and Bulgaria's Grigor

Dimitrov dominated the Championships, winning both titles in the girls'and boys' events respectively, and doing so without dropping a set. The boys' final of the first event was a showdown between No. 4 seed Dimitrov and the unseeded Romanian Sebastian lonescu. Having upset

from a nervous start to force Halep to play her best tennis of the tournament en route to a 63 62 victory. The only resistance Halep faced on the way to the final of the second event came from Bojana Jovanovski of Serbia & Montenegro in the semi-final. After a great start, Jovanovski lost her composure to fall 75 62. In the final, Halep once again dominated, defeating Yulia Klrienko of Ukraine 63 63.

Tournament Director Rene Busch said, "Owing to the feed-in format, the Development Championships is a great event especially for those players who have less competitive opportunities. The event also provided a

> unique opportunity for Estonian players and coaches to see some of the most promising European juniors."

No. 1 seed Vadim Pinko from Lithuania in the first round, lonescu went on to reach the final without dropping a set, but in the final Dimitrov dictated the pace and was more offensive in decisive points to win 75 75.

In the second event Dimitrov kept his form to win the semifinal against Pinko, seeded No. 2 this time, 61 64. In the final the Bulgarian underlined his dominance by winning against unseeded Cvetan Mihov of Bulgaria 62 62.

In the girls' event, top-seeded Halep coasted to a firstweek victory for the loss of just eight games. In the final she faced an unseeded opponent in the form of Viktorya Yemialyanova of Belarus, who had scored a string of upsets on her way to the final. Yemialyanova recovered the East European countries. From the tournament results it's obvious that the competition is getting tighter with more players coming from the Baltic region. The results of the players from the small nations such as lceland or Malta together with those of some of the Caucasus countries still shows the need for more competitions at home as well as international tournaments for this age group."

The 18 most promising players from the 14 & Under Development Championships will be invited to take part in the ITF/Tennis Europe 14 & Under Touring Teams in Europe this summer. Rising stars to have taken advantage of the event in recent years include Marcos Baghdatis (CYP) and Alyona Bondarenko (UKR).

EUROPEAN RANKINGS

There were few changes in the top ten European women during the spring, although there is one particularly significant difference; Maria Sharapova has overtaken Amelie Mauresmo, becoming the first Russian woman to hold the top spot. She's also likely to become the world #1 in the coming weeks, as top-ranked Lindsay Davenport skips the pre-Roland Garros European clay court season. Mauresmo's withdrawal from Warsaw, coupled with the need to defend titles in both Rome and Berlin means she is unlikely to be able to gain ground on either of her rivals.

After vanishing from the list after months of injuryenforced absence during which they slipped to #139 and #47 in the world , former top ranked Europeans Kim Clijsters and Justine Henin Hardenne look poised to reenter the list having risen to #17 and #22 respectively, after sweeping aside the opposition at three consecutive US Tier 1 events in March and April.

There are numerous changes in the men's list, as Rafael Nadal rises to second place behind Roger Federer, who came from two sets down to beat him in the Miami final in early April. Nadal went on to win in Monte Carlo and Barcelona, cutting Federer's lead to around 100 points, adding spice to the second Grand Slam of the year, on Nadal's favoured clay. There's further good news for the Spanish in that Juan Carlos Ferrero is returning to form. Good performances as the tour turns to clay have seen him rise to sixth in Europe.
