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SEE TENNIS LIVE



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March sees the launch of 'See Tennis Live', an initiative from T e n n i s E u r o p e aimed at inc r e a s i n g

Olli Mäenpää creasing knowledge of, and attendance at entry-level events across Europe.

The ambitious project is the first of its kind of this magnitude and its success will be keenly monitored for the duration of the season as we aim to launch an even more comprehensive tool for the 2004 season.

To capitalise on the current popularity of tennis, and following on from the European Tournament Conference in Warsaw at the end of last year, where the question of how to 'Fill the Stands' at the lesser-publicised events was high on the agenda, Tennis Europe will be issuing all ITF Men's and Women's Circuit Event Organisers with promotional packs designed to aid their efforts to market their tournaments and also to provide templates for producing the professional standard programmes, draw sheets and tournament information guides that have become customary at modern day events.

We spoke to Olli Mäenpää, Tennis Europe's Director of External Affairs, about the decision to adopt this strategy.

Why has Tennis Europe de-

cided to organise this campaign at this point?

"The latest trends show that tennis is now the second most popular sport in Europe, and we would like to capitalise on that and to increase the appetite for the sport at every level. The public gets their first chance to see future champions at entry-level events (for this reason the sub-text of the campaign is a focus on 'The Next Generation of Tennis Professionals') and the quality of play is surprisingly high, but because of constrictions on time and finances. the event organisers often are not able to promote their tournaments as they would perhaps like."

Who will receive the packs?

"All 376 ITF Men's and Women's Circuit events due to take place during the remainder of this year and the beginning of next. That's Men's satellite and Futures events, and women's \$10-75k tournaments."

What do you hope to achieve?

"Basically we would like to do two things; to increase awareness of ITF Circuit events in Europe, and to help the event organisers to produce promotional material to publicise their events. There are many potential benefits if the campaign is a success, and if we can stimulate interest in club tennis, that can only be good for the sport as a whole "


THE 'SEE TENNIS LIVE' CAMPAIGN

How will you gauge the effectiveness of the campaign?

"Hopefully we will see an increase in attendance over the year at events that have used the materials provided. We also intend to organise meetings and workshops at which we can meet the organisers and discuss how they felt about the campaign, and possible improvements. They can also share their experiences and debate the best ways to promote their events. We will also enclose feed-

back forms with our packs, and ask all event organisers to respond with their comments, and there are prizes to be won for their co-operation."

What are the long term plans for the campaign?



"We intend to run the scheme until the end of 2004 at least, and hope to able to expand next year to encourage people to see other grass roots events, such as juniors. The possibilities are endless and we will evaluate them with interest as this first year of the campaign progresses" If you are an event organiser look out for the packs, which should arrive with you at the end of March.

VETERAN PLAYERS OF THE YEAR 2002

The Tennis Europe Veterans Committee met in **Seefeld** (Austria) during the second week of the **European Veterans Indoors Championships**, where round 400 players competed in the younger age categories (Men 40 to 60, Women 40 to 55).

The previous week had seen around 250 participants competing for the titles in the categories Men 65 to 90 and Women 60 to 75.

The complete range of matches is played at Seefeld: singles, doubles, mixed doubles

and consolation, which makes a huge program with full days of competition starting early morning and finishing late at night!

It was also the duty of the Veterans Committee to express their best thanks to **Gunter Prell**, who created the European Veterans Rankings System in 1996 and since then has worked tirelessly to enable Tennis Europe to issue its own annual European rankings. Please note that due to the recent merge of the European and ITF Circuits, the European Veterans Tournaments are now included in the ITF ranking system.

SPAIN CLAIMS 2002 EUROPEAN TENNIS TROPHY

The dawning of the New Year brought confirmation that Spain had succeeded in claiming the overall Tennis Europe Trophy for the third time in four years.

A strong showing at the end of the season thanks to the efforts of the three ATP World Championship qualifiers and the women's Fed Cup team, who did enough to clinch the Professional title and pulled their overall points total ahead of second placed Germany, who were destined to finish as runners-up for a third consecutive year.

In addition to the Professional and Overall titles, Spain also won the Junior category, finishing ahead of the Czechs, who earlier in the season had been favourites to retain their title, winning the U16 and U18 Girls Summer Cups. Surprisingly this was the first time that the Junior achievement award has gone to Spain.

Veterans, Wheelchair Champions Defend Titles

Although a less impressive autumn season saw Germany finish in second place for a frustrating third consecutive year, they can take some consolation from their victory in the Veterans category; incredibly their twelfth consecutive win.

The Netherlands look set to take an equally decisive grip on the wheelchair trophy. Since its timely inclusion in 2001 they have been clear leaders in the category, although the British and French mounted a much stronger challenge in 2002.

This is the twelfth year that Tennis Europe has awarded the end of year titles, designed to highlight and reward achievement by the top-performing member nations in four main categories of tennis: the professional game, juniors, veterans and wheelchair tennis.

Award Ceremony

This years trophies will be awarded at the Tennis Europe Annual General Meeting in Ancona, Italy in May. The 2003 race for points is already underway, and Tennis Europe News will keep you updated with the latest

changes throughout the year.

ANTI-DOPING NEWS

The sports' anti-doping policies have received a boost, with two major developments occurring in the past few weeks.

Firstly, the ITF in conjunction with the World Anti Doping Agency (WADA) announced that blood testing would supplement urine detection of EPO (erythroprotein) and related substances with effect from January 2003.

EPO is a synthetic hormone banned due its performance enhancing and potentially dangerous effects on otherwise healthy athletes.

Another significant step in the battle against drugs in the sport was taken at the end of February, when the ITF announced that it would conduct out-of-competition tests in association with WADA. These enhancements should further strengthen the role of the Ten-

ther strengthen the role of the Tennis Anti-Doping Programme, an international drugs testing body recognised by the ITF, ATP and WTA, and whose guidelines are enforced at all levels of professional tennis.

EUROPEAN CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS

Tennis Europe has announced a new agreement to stage the European Club Championships for Women at AS Patton Rennes, France for the next three years.

The club, one of the most successful in the history of the tournament, will host the event during the second week of Wimbledon, and will offer full hospitality (accommodation with breakfast at a hotel in Rennes, plus lunch and dinner at the club) in addition to prize money of €3000 for the inner of the event, €1500 for the runner-up and €750 for the semifinalists. "We would like to thank Club AS Patton Rennes for their generous hospitality and commitment to furthering the success of this tournament" said Pierre-Paul De Keghel, Chairman, Team Championships and Regional Games Committee.

JUNIOR TOUR SUPERVISOR / QUALITY CO-ORDINATOR UPDATE

Even before 2002 had ended, the new season of the European Junior Tour was starting with the U12s tournament at Boulogne Billancourt, France. Although I was not able to attend that event, my site visits started right after the Christmas holidays with a trip to Czech Republic for the 3rd edition of the Tennisline Cup (16 & Under) which took place in Pribram from 13th to 19th of January. The Sportcentrum Roia there will play an important role in 2003, organising 3 tournaments in the first quarter of the year.

The following weekend I moved to Telford for the Teen Tennis, a category 1 14 & Under British tournament. More than 100 players came to the eight indoor courts of the Telford Tennis Centre, located just across from the official hotel, which gave the possibility for players and coaches to practice, play and lodge at close proximity.

Capacity crowds in France

Another long weekend concluded

my visits of the month of January, with a combined trip to Tarbes and Marcq en Baroeul. These France based category 1 tournaments once again confirmed their commitment for the improvement of Junior Tennis; in particular, "Les Petits As" in Tarbes, which was followed by more than 40,000 spectators during the week.

Moving North

February was also a very intensive month, characterised by visits to Denmark, Sweden, Lithuania and the three sites of the Winter Cups Qualifying Rounds. Rungsted Kyst in Denmark was the site of two tournaments. one 14 & Under category 2 and one 16 & Under category 3, while just across the sea two similar events were held in the very nice Swedish town of Helsingborg (host of many a Davis Cup tie). Both were very well organised and featured players from all over Europe, and even as far as China.

In Siauliai, Lithuania, I was also

able to attend two different events, the Siauliai Open and the Evian Cup. A temperature far below zero did not dampen the enthusiasm of the participants.

Winter Cups

Finally, as I mentioned before, February was also the month of the qualifying round of the Winter Cups. Since most of them were played in Italy, I travelled the whole weekend in order to be able to attend the Boys 16 & Under in Livorno, the Girls 14 & Under in Forte dei Marmi, as well as the Girls 16 & Under in Tolmezzo. As I write, the final rounds have just been played. I will therefore comment further on the Winter Cups in next issue of Tennis Europe news.

As you can see from these few words, the year 2003 started in a hectic manner and promises to be another interesting and intensive year for the Junior Competitions of Tennis Europe.

2003 EUROPEAN WINTER CUPS

The European Winter Cups 2003, which began with the Qualifying Rounds in mid-February, came to a close during the week of 28 February-2 March 2003 when the Final Rounds of each of the four age events in the competition were staged.

This team competition, which was created in 1977 to provide juniors with an opportunity to play a high quality event during the winter months under indoor conditions, now includes both boys and girls 14/16 & under.

Participation in the 2003 European Winter Cups and the standard of the tennis played were both high. The venues for the four Final Rounds were Ronchin (France), Montecatini (Italy), Pruhonice (Czech Republic) and San Miniato (Italy).

The standard of organization displayed by the national associations which staged the Final, and also the Qualifying Rounds, was very professional.

The best 8 teams in each age event from the Qualifying Rounds competed in the relevant Final Round. In the Final Rounds Russian teams were winners in both boys and girls 16 & under categories, showing the strength and potential of Russian Junior tennis once again. The boys and girls 14 & under events were won by Belgium and Belarus respectively.
