He kept this position during 15 years, longest period for a President of our Association as per today. At the same time he was very involved with the International Tennis Federation and was awarded the title of Honorary Life Vice-President this year at the ITF Annual General Meeting in Marrakech

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The European Tennis Association was founded in 1975. Why did you accept the position, as the first General Secretary and what were your aims for this

new European body?

I accepted the position of the General Secretary of this newly created Association because I felt it was very challenging and interesting as tennis was already at that stage a big part of my life. I was a Davis Cup player and a Davis Cup Captain by then. In that period, tennis was dominated by USA and our aim was to create a European governing body that would be responsible and in charge for Europe.

During the 15 years as Tennis Europe President, what was your biggest achievement and satisfaction?

During the period of 15 years, as you can imagine we had more than one satisfaction and achieve-

ment but for me the biggest was the Women's circuit in Europe. The European Tennis Association (Tennis Europe) was the first to start the Women's circuit. Nobody else in the world had a Women's circuit at that point. In addition to that, a great satisfaction and achievement was the building up with great success, the junior activities such as the Junior Championships and Junior Tour.

At the same time you served the European Tennis Association and ITF. How did you feel about this combination and what was your motivation for doing it for such a long time?

The combination between ITF and its regional governing body European Tennis Association (Tennis Europe) was great. There were no problems and in fact, I felt it was very important from both sides to have a direct link between them.

The motivation of doing it for such a long time it was the love and admiration that I had for the sport named tennis. Tennis has always been a big part of my life. Tennis has given me so much and I felt I had to give something back. It was fascinating.

The last ITF AGM in Morocco has nominated you as Honorary Life Vice-President. What does this award mean to you?

It means a lot to me. I felt proud and honoured to receive this title. It is very difficult to explain it in words when you receive something like that. The best thing that you feel, is the fact that you are still part of the big tennis family.

You have seen many Top Tennis players coming and going. Which player impressed you the most and why?

I admire the game when it's complete. Complete to me, means when a player is not all the time playing from the baseline or being all the time at the net. During my early days I was impressed by Rod Laver and in nowadays Pete

Sampras.

How do you spend your spare time that is left from tennis nowadays?

Do I have any spare time? I own a small clock shop in Bern, which keeps me quite busy. I have three grandchildren; I am a member in the ITF committee named PILA, which is in charge to evaluate the organisation of Davis Cup — Fed Cup ties. Last but not least I play golf with the family.

MERGE IN VETERANS' TENNIS

The International Tennis Federation and Tennis Europe have agreed to join forces for the good of Veteran's Tennis in Europe and Worldwide.

The European Veterans Circuit was started by a very enthusiastic Veterans Committee of the European Tennis Association in 1996, in order to better link the competitions taking place throughout Europe and to support the establishing of the new computerized rankings to start the same year.

On one side it was a success as the very sophisticated ranking system was immediately well adopted by a majority of players, but on the other side it became more and more clear that the situation with two parallel Circuits and Rankings run in Europe was not satisfactory. It created a big confusion among the National Associations, Tournaments Organisers and Players. Following discussions with the ITF and within Tennis Europe, the Veterans Committee and Committee of Management came to the conclusion that the best solution was to join forces with the ITF, for the benefit of everybody.

Therefore, starting from January 1, 2003, Tennis Europe will administrate on behalf of the ITF the European Tournaments part of the ITF Veterans Circuit: this means send-

ing out application forms for next year's Calendar, establishing the Calendar, collecting the sanction fees, inputting the results for establishing the rankings, liaising with National Associations and Tournament Organisers.

President John James said: "I am convinced that this was the right decision as the Veterans Players deserve to get the best possible service from Tennis Europe and ITF. I am sure that all parties involved will agree".

MASSIMO MORELLI FROM ITALY WAS APPOINTED SUPERVISOR/QUALITY COORDINATOR OF THE EUROPEAN JUNIOR TOUR

The delegates from 37 European National Associations agreed on the occasion of the last Annual General Meeting in Cambridge to invest some money from the reserve funds into the Junior game and to create the position of a Supervisor/Quality Coordinator for the European Junior Tour.

The European Junior Tour is no doubt one of the most successful activities of Tennis Europe. It started in 1990 with a total of 43 tournaments and met immediately with the great interest of National Associations, Clubs, Coaches and Players. It consists today of nearly 250 tournaments for the categories 16, 14 and 12 & under taking place all over Europe.

Consequently, the concern of the Junior Committee goes now to the quality more than to the quantity. Having this in mind, and thanks to the approval of the Annual General Meeting to use some reserve funds, it was decided to create the position of Supervisor/Quality Coordinator for the European Junior Tour.

"This has been certainly a very

important step in the further development of the European Junior Tour which is a big asset of our Association" The President, John James said.

The post was advertised in the April edition of the Tennis Europe News and more than 25 applications, all from high qualified referees and coaches, were received.

On 4th July, it was decided to appoint Massimo Morelli, who was found to be the most suitable candidate for the job.

Massimo Morelli is 36 years old, lives in Milan (Italy), was employed as an Export Manager for a textile Company and is silver badge Referee, which provides him with a broad knowledge of tournament or-

ganisation. Besides his mother language, which is Italian, Massimo speaks English, French and Spanish.

Massimo's function includes assisting the tournament organisation with administrative and technical procedures, developing new ideas and setting priorities for the future as well as acting as European Junior Tour Supervisor to ensure the rules and regulations are followed, setting minimum standards and controlling the organisation.

He will be employed for a first period of 18 months and he started at the end of July.

We wish him much satisfaction and success in this challenging enterprise. (Tennis Europe News Release)

2002 EUROPEAN INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

July is, as usual, time for European Individual Championships. This year Italy, France and Switzerland have been selected by Tennis Europe Junior Committee to host this important competition which had the participation of the top European players of each category and showed outstanding interest from the media as well as from the spectators.

As the Junior Tour Supervisor/ Quality Coordiantor of Tennis Europe I had the chance to travel to all the three venues hosting the competitions.

My tour started from Genova, Italy where the Tennis Club Genova organised the Under 16 competition, together with the cooperation of three other different clubs. The atmosphere of the sea was inspiring Tomeu Salva from Spain and Monica Niculescu from Romania who won, respectively the boys and the girls tournament

My next step was to Vichy, France for the U14 competition, attended by all the top European players plus some under 12 also. The beautiful Tennis Club de Vichy was invaded by more than 80 boys and than 70 girls to attend the competition which saw the victory of Roberto Bautista from Spain among boys and of Michaela Krajicek of Nederlands among girls.

Finally my trip ended in Klosters, in the middle of the Swiss alps, for the U18 competition. After a week of great tennis Tomas Berdych and Eva Birnerova, both from Czech Republic had their triumph. Particularly, the girls final was played between seed n°1 and seed n°2, both from Czech Republic.

Generally all three tournaments were very well organised, giving players and coaches the feeling to be like at home. Particularly the off-court social activities were well implemented, giving to our young champions the possibility to make sightseeing as well as rafting or simply going to the disco. Players had the chance to spend time together both on and off court, exchanging experiences and living daily in an international ambience. National Associations demonstrate

to trust in the role of Tennis Europe in organising these competitions by sending their best players.

Crowd attendance was impressive since the very first days of each competition, reaching his top at final stage, where you could hardly find a place to attend the different finals if not entered on site well in advance. The lesson that I learned is that there is a growing interest for this Championships, which already represent one of the most important meeting in the Junior Calendar.

Tennis Europe is looking forward to continuing with these great venues for the next year's competition, being sure that the organisers will do their best in order to further improve their tournaments.

The players were invited to be members of the team following excellent performances at the ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Championships held in Cyprus in April of this year.

The tour kicked off with a 5-day training camp in Tallin where the players were able to practise under the direction of Mazonas on the

same courts of the club that was hosting the first scheduled event, the "Estonian Open 14U – Babolat Cup 2". The team had a slow and disappointing start to the tour, with only Lynn Philippe of Luxembourg winning through to the second round of the event, only to lose out in straight sets to Alexandra Malyarchikova of Belarus 62 63.

The team then moved to Riga for the category 2 event "Riga 800" where they hoped that a change of scenery would bring with it a change of luck and they weren't disappointed. Lynn Philippe put in an excellent performance to reach the semi-finals only to be stopped in her tracks by Alexandra Panova of Russia, who went on to win the tournament and reach the doubles semi-final together with team mate and compatriot Tiffany Cornelius.

On the boys' side, Charis Stylianou having knocked out Dzianis Skadarou (BLR) and Krisjanis Stabis (LAT) went down 64 62 to Aliaksandr Zotov of Russia despite playing one of his best matches on the tour. In the boys' doubles semi-final, compatriots Neophitos loannides and Charis Stylianou were beaten in a three-set thriller 76 46 62 by the eventual winners Roman Petrounin and George Morgoev of Russia.

From Riga, the capital of Latvia, the team then set off for the last tournament on the tour, Liepaja where playing conditions were excellent. Max Clement of Luxembourg reached the semi-final of the boys' singles event, but was over-

come by the power of Mikhail Karpov from Croatia who went on to win the singles event and reached the boys' doubles semi-finals with fellow compatriot Mathias Najfeld. In the girls' singles Lynn Philippe won through to the quarterfinals losing 76 61 to eventual winner Maria Mossolova of Russia.

Gitanas Mazonas, who was guiding his first ITF/Tennis Europe Team commented: "Working with the Small States Team has been a unique experience. I believe our players did very well outside their own environment and their skills were tested against very good players from Eastern Europe who are traditionally both mentally tough and excellent fighters on court".

He went on to say: "The Small States Team has never won so many matches during the tour and I hope that the players will remember the experience gained away from home in a very competitive environment".

The players have now joined their National teams in Vichy, France for the highlight event of the year, the Tennis Europe Individual 14 & Under Junior Championships where it is hoped that they will build on their performances from the last 3 weeks.

2002 EUROPEAN COACHES SYMPOSIUM

All 48 member nations of Tennis Europe have been invited to attend the 25th edition of the European Coaches Symposium to be held from 12 - 17 October at Vale do Lobo, Portugal and organised by Tennis Europe in conjunction with the Portugal Tennis Federation.

The four-days conference will concentrate on the development of high performance players and will provide updates on the latest research in the coaching and sport science fields. Three themes will be covered during the four-day conference: general interest in tennis, tennis sport science and specific topics given by top coaches.

The programme will include on and off court presentations on topics

such as: High Quality Player Development, Tennis Methodology and Biomechanics, Tennis Medicine and Psychology, Wheelchair Tennis, Tennis Technology and many others.
