2002 AGM IN CAMBRIDGE—REVIEW

The Lawn Tennis Association hosted from March 15-17 the Tennis Europe AGM for the third time after 1979 and 1988, providing as usual excellent meeting facilities together with a very attractive social programme for delegates and partners.

The meetings started for the delegates on Friday afternoon with an open session. The first item was a presentation by Mark Marshall, LTA County and Club Services

Manager about the "Club Vision" project. The session continued with a preview on the elections for Presidency that were on the agenda of the plenary session. The three candidates for Presidency P.P. de Keghel, J. James and A. Pujol had the opportunity to tell the delegates why they wished to become President of Tennis Europe and what were their visions of the Association's future. (Continued page 2)

Arne was a member of the Committee of Management of the European Tennis Association during the last twelve years.

He started in 1990 and at the same time he became the

Chairman of the Officiating Committee. Under his leadership the co-operation between the European Tennis Association and the ITF Officiating Department became much closer and efficient and it can certainly be said that our Association contributed a lot to the

improvement of officials education and consequently to achieve the aim of increasing the number and quality of officials throughout Europe.

One of Arne's big concern was the cost of officiating and he was always very happy to report that the costs were under control!

As a member of the Committee of Management, Arne's big asset was his conviction that the best way to achieve a goal was a good negotiation and to this purpose to get all parties round one table.

Jacques Dürr (France)

Member of the Junior Committee from 1990 to 2002, Chairman of the Junior Committee in 1997/1998, Member of the Tennis Europe Committee of Management from 1996 to 1998.

With his great knowledge of tennis and his experience he gave a major contribution to the development of the junior game in Europe and thanks to his input the Junior Committee could take decisions that were very important for its activity.

Franz Feldbausch (Germany)

Franz Feldbausch was a Member of the European Working Group that initiated the foundation of the European Tennis Association, and he attended many Annual General Meetings of our Association as delegate from Germany. He has been since 1987 a very active member of the Junior Committee and his enthusiasm could not be stopped by his severe health problems.

Wolfgang Hofer (Germany)

At the time that the European Tennis Association started, Wolfgang Hofer visited regularly Basel for his professional activity. He was of course very involved in the German Tennis Association and also as Chairman of the LTTC Rot Weiss Berlin he had many friends in the European tennis family. It was therefore very convenient to trust him with the task of Honorary Auditor, what he did during 27 years.

John Robbins (Great Britain)

John Robbins joined the Committee of Management of the European Tennis Association in 1996. During the six years of his involvement he chaired both the Veterans and Marketing/Communication Committees. He was certainly a key person for the Committee of Management particularly in issues related to Rules and Relationship with the ITF. His advice allowed very often to make the right decisions.

Tennis Europe must continue to encourage its member nations to attract future organisers to the world game. The ITF and the professional game need European Tennis to be strong, not only in terms of players but with expert administrators, tournament directors and officials.

MINI-TENNIS FESTIVAL DAY IN ALBANIA

Following the launch of the ITF / Tennis Europe School Tennis Initiative back in October 2000 the Albanian Tennis Federation organised in March a mini-tennis festival day in the main square of Tirana, the capital city of the Republic of Albania.

More than 1,000 children had a chance to play mini-tennis in front of the Major of the City and the Government Authorities.

Over a sunny day, a colourful and cheerful setting with music and dances performed by the Tirana Ballet School accompanied the mini-tennis activities throughout the event.

The President of the Albanian Tennis Federation Mr Arben Alushi who together with recently passed away President Perlat Voshtina were instrumental in setting up the project, commented: "Today is a great day for tennis in Albania, I feel that this grass-roots programme will not only contribute to the development of tennis, but also help us to show to the Municipality and Government authorities that we badly need a tennis stadium where all of those children can play tennis and grow up in a healthy sport environment".

The official Sponsor of the event was Orbit Ltd, the "free sugar chew" Company which provided t-shirts and caps for all the children as well as the colourful setting surrounding the square.

The ITF / Tennis Europe were represented by Luca Santilli Development Officer for Europe who came

to meet with the local Authorities and to congratulate the National Association on the new Initiative. He said: "I believe that this is a very important project for the development of tennis in Albania. It will not only allow us to increase the number of children playing tennis by introducing the idea of mini-tennis in schools, but we also hope that through the phase two of the STI project which will be shortly launched we can identify some talented youngsters."

The ITF / Tennis Europe support the STI projects by supplying ITF branded mini-tennis equipment, educational material and with a financial contribution for the STI National Co-ordinator, and providing direct assistance from the Development Officer.

2002 ITF/TENNIS EUROPE SMALL STATES CHAMPIONSHIPS

Luxembourg and Cyprus proved to be the dominating nations at the third ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Championships – 14 & Under, which took place for the second successive year in Limassol, Cyprus at the Famagusta

Tennis Club, from 6 – 13 April 2002.

The competition, which is reserved for the Small States in Europe as well as Albania and Azerbaijan saw San Marino participating for the first time since the event's inception, taking the total number of participating countries to eight. Sixteen girls and sixteen boys battled hard throughout the two-week competition and the feed-in system which was used for the consolation matches, guaranteed maximum competitive match experience with each player having one singles match every day.

In the girls' event, Lynn Philippe from Luxembourg dominated proceedings by winning both tournaments without dropping a set throughout the Championships. Her compatriot Tiffany Cornelius also proved to be a good contender, reaching the semifinals in the first week and then stepping up a gear in the second week to face Philippe in the final. Close behind Philippe and Cornelius who finished in first and second place respectively in the final order of merit, was Irene Letseva of Cyprus, Lynn Blau of Luxembourg and Martina Agarici of San Marino.

On the boys' side, Neophytos Ioannides of Cyprus performed extremely well, winning the two boys' singles tournaments proving that he was too good for the two-time finalist, Max Clement from Luxembourg. Hot on the heels of Ioannides and Clement were their compatriots Charis Stylianou of Cyprus and Mathias Naifeld of Luxembourg who reached the semifinals of both tournaments.

Luca Santilli, ITF / Tennis Europe Development Officer for Europe said, "The feedback from the nations on this project has been very positive. In just three years, the Championships have become one of the most important events on the junior calendar for the Small States of Europe". He added, "I hope that more and more tournament organisers in Europe will offer a feed-in format as employed this week as it is one of the best ways to provide the maximum competitive opportunities to junior players."

ESTHER VERGEER NOMINATED FOR LAUREUS AWARD

Australian paraplegic sailor Vinnie Lauwers, last year's Laureus World Sportsperson of the Year with a Disability, will be monitoring this year's awards ceremony in Monaco with particular interest. Belgium-born Lauwers, the first yachtsman with a disability to sail solo round the world, has been unable to compete in the sporting arena for the past eight months due to ongoing spinal problems. In a few weeks time, on the night of May 14, the winners of the 2002 Laureus World Sports Awards will be announced during a television ceremony staged in the regal surrounds of Monaco's Grimaldi Forum -- and Lauwers will be watching with keen interest.

"Over the seven and a half months I spent sailing around the world, I never once in my wildest dreams thought that my vision might come to fruition with such a great award," he said after being honoured in Monaco last year.

"It's a great honour and I shall really treasure it as one of my greatest achievements".

"I haven't really had the time in recent months to check out who has exceeded in their field in the world of sport with a disability during 2001 but, if the five nominees are anything like last year, all four of them will be truly deserving winners," Lauwers said this week. Nominees in the category of Laureus World Sportsperson of the Year with a Disability are selected by a Specialist Panel and among the likely contenders for this year's accolade are Swiss cyclist Beat Schwarzenbach, Icelandic swimmer Kristín Rós Hákonardóttir, German alpine skier Gerd Schönfelder and Dutch wheelchair tennis ace Esther Vergeer Vergeer virtually swept the board in her discipline last year, clinching singles titles at the NEC Wheelchair Tennis Masters, the

Italian Open, the Citta di Livorno, the Swiss Open, the French Open, the British Open, the Belgian Open, the Dutch Open and the Lakeshore Foundation World Challenge.

She also tasted doubles success in the NEC Wheelchair Tennis Masters, the Italian Open, the Swiss Open, the British Open, the Belgian Open and the Dutch Open.

The Opening and Closing Ceremonies were organized by the coaches of the tennis academy and students from the Military Academy. The umpires were from the Georgian Tennis Federation and volunteers included professional male and female tennis players of the national teams. In total, 14 volunteers worked to make the tournament a success.

At the closing ceremonies on February 21, the federation president, said: "The eagerness and effort the Special Olympics athletes demonstrated during their matches is a example of true athletic spirit." Special Olympics tennis player and top seed Gigori Vepkhvadze said: "I am happy I can play in tennis together with my friends because tennis is an
