Tennis Europe has published the first 'Race to the Junior Masters' rankings for 2011. Instead of the regular rolling 52-week rankings, the Race list details points earned since the first event of the season. The Top 6 European players in the Race rankings at the end of the Tour season qualify to play at the Tennis Europe Junior Masters, alongside the European Junior Championship winner and runner-up from each age category.

From now on, the Race rankings will be published every Tuesday alongside the 52-week rolling rankings for players aged 14 and 16 & Under.

The Tennis Europe Junior Masters was introduced in 1996 and is devised to reward the best-performing players of the year on the Tour with a final chance to compete against each other for the title of Masters champion. Players such as Kim Clijsters and Rafael Nadal feature amongst the former champions, while Francesca Schiavone and Andy Murray are also former participants.

Russian players take early leads

Russian players dominate the 14 & Under rankings, occupying the top two positions in both the boys' and girls' lists. Roman Safiullin leads the way, having won five titles so far this season already, establishing a 29-1 win/loss record, including a win over second ranked Andrey Rublev in the Maia final just two weeks ago.

The girls' #1 spot is shared between Anastasiya Rychagova and Anastasiya Komardina. Whilst battling for the top spot in singles, they have formed a formidable doubles partnership this year, and are unbeaten so far in five tournaments (four on the 14&U circuit, and one at 16&U). The pair has also met twice in singles finals, with the head-to-head record currently standing at one win apiece.

With two titles from three finals so far this season, Pavel Staubert (CZE) leads the boys' 16 & Under list ahead of Cyprus' Petros Chrysochos, while Romania's loana Rosca sits comfortably atop the girls' race, having won all three events she has contested so far in 2011

Team events also count towards a players' Race Ranking, so a successful run at the Tennis Europe Winter Cups by HEAD >>

Race to the Junior Masters 14/16 & Under

<< or European Summer Cups can help in the quest to seal a spot at the Junior Masters.

France's winning Boys 14 & Under Winter Cups team of Ronan Joncour, Mandresy Rakotomalala and Joseph Giullin appear at #s 6, 8 and 11, while the winning Russian girls' team occupies three of the top four spots.

Last year's Tennis Europe Junior Masters was held in Napoli, Italy, from 8-10 October. The dates and venue for the 2011 event will be confirmed shortly.

In the Spotlight: Tennis Europe President Jacques Dupré

At last month's Tennis Europe Annual General Meeting in Amsterdam, Jacques Dupré was re-elected as the president of the organisation for a second consecutive term. We took the opportunity to ask him to reflect on his time at the helm of the federation, and his plans for the future.

Congratulations on your re-election. How would you reflect on your first term as President of Tennis Europe?

Thank you very much. I think that this first mandate was beneficial for Tennis Europe because of the great work done by the members of the Board and the entire staff. I particularly appreciate the solidarity and the conviviality, which marks the relations between all of the elected representatives, and makes the work so much more pleasant and efficient.

What do you hope to achieve during your next three-year mandate?

There are still a lot of things to do, as you may have guessed. It is an ongoing challenge to try to improve all of the currently existing aspects of our activities, such as sports, administration and commercial matters. Amongst the priorities, I hope to place a focus on helping the development of those nations that are facing the most difficulties by helping them with the training of directors and managers so that they can work towards establishing formal structures, for example. I also hope that we can adopt increasingly flexible approaches to solving problems that are submitted by those who work in the field. We need to listen, to comprehend, to be flexible without falling on any forms of demagoguery or laxity.

Several key steps were taken at the recent AGM. Why did you feel it was important to amend the constitution?

Yes, without a doubt it was necessary to revise our constitution and adapt it to the realities and necessities of our era. Nevertheless, I would like to mention that there are no fundamental changes but rather adaptations to the existing constitution.

The membership status of the Netherlands was upgraded, the first time we have had a new 'A' nation in 10 years. Why did you support this?

Indeed I am delighted to see that the KNLTB will join the classification of A-nations. To judge the quality of a federation and its influence I do not think that one's sole criteria should be sporting results and perfor-

mance, which naturally fluctuates from one period to another. I think that the quality and structure of the KNLTB is quite remarkable, and its plan of development, the number of licensed players, their unfailing application of new initiatives, such as 'Play and Stay' for example, and their incredible success in wheelchair tennis, which serves as a role model for the rest of the world makes the ascending of category perfectly justified. I am also convinced that thanks to what has happened in the past, we will see a new generation of women and men players emerge in the years to come from the Netherlands, further reinforcing the legitimacy of this decision.

Also at the Annual General Meeting, Tennis Europe voted to increase the membership fees paid by national federations for the first time since 1999. Why was this necessary?

Indeed, and I want to thank the members who have agreed to pass this motion for a moderate increase of fees without any opposition. As I indicated during the AGM, these contributions had not been increased in over ten years, even though all the costs relating to our activities rose enormously in the same time. This was an error. Secondly, these new resources will be fully allocated to help tennis to develop with a particular focus on those nations that are in most difficulty. Finally, if there are special economic situations in certain countries that are justified, we will listen and try to find adapted solutions. I firmly believe that this will allow us to progress and we will propose annually a regular and very modest increase so that we do not make the same mistake.

You also serve as a Vice-President of the French Tennis Federation. Were you happy with the decision to maintain Roland Garros at its present location? >>

<< Of course, and I strongly supported the project. I would like to say that there was an excellent federal strategy with regards to this matter, and this allowed the tournament to stay in Paris. Contrary to what is often said, this choice does not opt for the past at the expense of modernity, but it is a choice made to safeguard the history, the tradition and the future. Thus the risk of trivialisation of the tournament is avoided, which in the actual global context would have been a mistake. But there are many other convincing arguments that could also be made to justify this choice.

The Tennis 10s rule change is something that will affect all member nations in 2012. How do you think this will benefit tennis in general, and what will be done to help those nations that might struggle to implement the new rules?

I think that this rule change - which is obligatory in 2012 – will be a major breakthrough for our sport, making it more fun and providing easy access for all the young players. I also think that the new rule will favour technical and tactical learning for all, which is a great outcome and consequently very positive. It is clear that under the existing development programmes, we will help the nations to get considerably involved in embracing this approach to tennis, which it should be remembered, can also be adapted for adults. This is much needed, and can serve to greatly

strengthen the functioning of tennis programmes in many nations.

You are very passionate about the development of the sport and are the Chairman of the Development Advisors Group of the ITF. What does this role involve?

This role as chairman of the group is indeed a great passion of mine. The Development Advisors Group is composed of Lucy Garvin, Anil Khanna, Ismail El Shafei, Chris Kypriotis and Dave Miley - who does a remarkable job - and has the objective of developing the sport across all of the continents. The work is not simple, I'm sure you'll agree, because the economic situations, the structures and therefore the levels of development of the nations concerned are extremely diverse. Nevertheless, we launched a major inquiry to find out if the chosen activities of the ITF satisfied these needs globally and the replies confirmed that we were on the right track while placing an emphasis on the deficit of human resources. I think as well that from the perspective of the help that is given by the ITF Development Programme, we must work in the interests of our sport to restore a true solidarity between the nations and regions of the world. The sooner we see male and female champions emerge from all corners of the planet, the more attractive the sport becomes, and the further established it will become as a major sporting discipline. But still, there are many challenges that remain to be overcome.

Tennis Europe Coaches' Education Conference

Tennis Europe has announced details of the forth-coming Coaches' Education Conference, which is due to be hosted by the Portuguese Tennis Federation in Vilamoura, from September 29th – October 2nd

The event will focus on coaches' education in Europe and will examine topics such as development of national associations coaches education systems, competency-based coaches' education, continuous education and licensing systems.

The event is open to a maximum of two delegates from each of Tennis Europe's member nations. However, all participants should be the persons in charge of the national coaches' education programmes and/or tutors in the national coaches'

education programmes.

The event will be preceded by a Level 1 Tutors' Workshop for representatives from nations that currently participate in the development programmes. This workshop is intended for those delivering Level 1 courses in such countries, and will look at ITF methodology in teaching beginner and intermediate players, communication skills for tutors and development of national coaches' education systems, amongst other topics.

Focus on Italy: New initiatives from the Italian Tennis Federation



A Summer for Champions

The Italian Tennis Federation (FIT) Summer Centers were launched

over 30 years ago, and are the first summer campuses ever created in Italy. At the centers, boys and girls aged 6 to 16 (ranging from beginners to advanced players, born between 1994 and 2004) are supervised by highly qualified and specialized federation experts and coaches, in a sport-oriented environment, where tennis is the real protagonist. They have the opportunity to play tennis and to socialize, thanks to the many recreational activities that also take place each day at the Centers.

6 summer Centers are on offer this year (two more than in 2010). They are all located in renowned holiday sites in Italy, ranging from the mountainous north to Italy's hilly regions and Sicily.

Following last year's success, the FIT has extended its presence in the UK and offers the combined experience of tennis and English classes in Nottingham.

For the more experienced tennis players, Sestola (the elite tennis centre) will offer the unique opportunity to participate in elite technical tennis sessions and to play tournaments with Italy's best 14/16 & Under players. Participation here is by invitation only. The technical program is designed by the expert coaches of the Italian Federation National Tennis Centre and the 'Roberto Lombardi' Higher Institute of Tennis Education.

All of the other Centers are open to all youngsters. Aside from tennis, players are able to choose from many other sports, including volleyball, basketball, soccer, archery, mountain bike, climbing, step-aerobics, orienteering, swimming, hiking and horse riding. In addition, there's the chance to relax and enjoy each other's company thanks to the fun evenings at the Centre's discos, with games and themed parties.

Last year, several top players visited the camps, with Francesca Schiavone, Flavia Pennetta, Potito Starace, Simone Bolelli and Roberta Vinci amongst those to spend some time on court with the kids and pass on their best advice.

Families can choose between the most conveniently located of the nine centers, and the dates ranging from mid-June and the beginning of August. The tennis activities designed by our National coaches, the presence of qualified instructors to coach the other sports and the full-time presence of a Health and First Aid team, are all high guarantees of reliability to par-

FIT Ranking Program

The Italian Tennis Federation has launched a national tennis system of teaching assessment and quality certification called 'FIT Ranking Program'.

The aims of the program are twofold. First of all, the FIT aims to create a more enjoyable and modern system of tennis coaching. Secondly, the Federation wants to provide the right tools and measures to continuously and objectively monitor the qualitative level of their tennis schools and coaches

All Italian tennis schools admitted to the Federal funding programs (named PIA, or Integrated Area Plans) will be obliged to apply the rules prescribed by the FIT Ranking Programs and respect the activities included for their 12&U pupils.

Among such activities and rules are those suggested by the ITF Tennis 10s program which will become compulsory from January 1st 2012; three types of balls and court sizes, depending on the age of the young players. New scoring systems and different competition rules according to the number of courts and players available will also be introduced, with prizes and awards for all. In Italy, after all, "Tennis is Easy, Fun and Healthy!"

The competition will run once again in 2011.


John Robbins

Tennis Europe was greatly saddened to learn of the death of John Robbins, who passed away last month at the age of 79.

A hugely respected figure in British tennis, Mr. Robbins was former President of the Lawn Tennis

Association (1994-1996) and served for many years as an LTA Councillor and Board Member.

As President of the LTA, he was a regular attendee of the Annual General Meetings of both Tennis Europe and the ITF.



Beyond the Baseline...

Four Roland Garros wild cards have been confirmed: Irina Falconi and Tim Smyczek won the USTA's play-off competition, while Casey Dellacqua and Bernard Tomic received invitations from Tennis Australia, thanks to a reciprocal agreement between the Grand Slam organising nations.

The United States of America and France have been demoted from the Fed Cup by BNP Paribas World group for the first time in its history following defeats to Germany and Spain respectively in the recent play-offs.

The U.S.-based Champions Series of legends' tournaments has been redesigned, and will see 12 onenight events take place over a five-week period starting September 22. Draws will feature four of seven players - Sampras, McEnroe, Agassi, Chang, Courier, Borg and Wilander – who have accounted for a combined 52 Grand Slam singles titles.

Former #1s John McEnroe and Jimmy Connors will play each other for the first time in 10 years when they meet in World Team Tennis this summer.

Ion Tiriac has confirmed that he still intends to use blue clay courts at the Mutua Madrid Open in the future, subject to approval by the sport's authorities. Currently one of the tournament's practice courts is blue.

Coaching news: Vera Zvonareva has split with Sergei Demekhin and is now working with Karen Krotov. Robin Soderling is reported to have split with Claudio Pistolesi. Meanwhile, Caroline Wozniacki's father has revealed that he is considering hiring Martina Navratilova as a consultant for the world #1.

Rafael Nadal was presented with the International Juan Antonio Samaranch Prize in Madrid last week in recognition of his sporting achievements. Novak Djokovic has meanwhile been honoured with order of Saint Sava of the first degree, the highest decoration awarded by the Serbian Orthodox Church, for his generosity and dedication to the religion.

Press reports have claimed the **Serena Williams** has recently spent time laying down vocals for a rap album.

Kim Clijsters has resumed training after tearing ankle ligaments last month, keeping her out of all Roland Garros warm-ups. The player was also listed in Time magazine's recent '100 Most Influential People' list.

Maria Sharapova has donated a further \$250,000 to expand a United Nations Development Programme that provides sports and physical activities for youngsters in the areas affected by the Chernobyl nuclear disaster.

The International Tennis Hall of Fame held a special ceremony at the recent Barcelona Open BancSabadell event to honour Spanish tennis legends Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario, Manolo Santana and Andres Gimeno, who were presented with unique rings to celebrate their achievements in the sport.

Former world #2 Tommy Haas returned to action last week in Munich after a 14-month layoff, taking part in the doubles event with Radek Stepanek. Fernando Gonzalez and Juan Carlos Ferrero have also returned to the circuit after extended injury breaks.

Just 14 hours after winning the Charleston title, world #1 Caroline Wozniacki was back on court – at the ATP Monte Carlo event. The Dane lost an exhibition set to Roland Garros champion Francesca Schiavone to celebrate Women's Day at the tournament

The ITF World Beach Tennis Championships will take place next weekend at the Foro Italico in Rome. Former WTA pros Natasha Zvereva and Olga Barabanschikova are amongst the entries joining the world's best Beach Tennis players.

Carlos Mova and Fabrice Santoro are the two latest additions to the ATP Champions Tour, with both players set to make their debuts in Bogota on May 19th.

The Johan Cruyff Foundation has extended its sponsorship of wheelchair tennis agreeing to support the ITF's Silver Fund for a further two years (2011-2012), and the junior programmes for 2011.

The ITF has also announced that BNP Paribas willbecome the new title sponsor of the wheelchair tennis World Team Cup for five years from 2012.

Gap Year Tennis has launched, with bases in the UK and in Murcia, Spain, with the aim of fast tracking Gap Year students into Futures tournaments. The scheme is designed for academics, for whom fulltime tennis is not an option, and offers weekly. monthly or full time gap year programs. More details at www.gap-year-tennis.com



Tennis Europe Junior Tour Rankings - Overall

With effect from January 2010, Tennis Europe introduced a new junior ranking system, devised to

give a unified overall list that shows the relative strengths of all players, regardless of where they achieved their results or picked up points,

A player's overall total includes points from Tennis Europe Junior Tour 16 and 14 & Under events, plus points earned by players in these age categories who participate in ITF Junior Circuit and professional tournaments, all of which are weighted according to their relative strengths.

Tennis Europe Junior Tour Rankings - 14 & Under

The Easter break gave rise to an explosion of tournaments on the Tennis Europe Junior Tour, with

almost two dozen events played across the three age categories in the last fortnight.

Most of the top players have been in action. Roman Safiullin (RUS) edged closer to the #1 spot by beating current leader and compatriot Andrey Rubley for the Category 1 Maia title. Another Russian, Anastasiya Komardina, won her first 16 & Under event in Brno, and now stands just ten points behind Belinda Bencics' top ranking.

Estonia's Kenneth Raisma is the highest new entry, breaking into the Top Ten having won three tournaments from five finals so far in 2011.

The Top Ten European men this week also make up the world's Top Ten for just the second time in history. With a semifinal finish at the recent ATP World Tour 500 event in Barcelona, Nicolas Almagro leapfrogged Mardy Fish to break into the Top Ten for the first time, the third Spaniard in the current list.

Further up the ranking, Robin Soderling's failure to defend his points from his 2010 Barcelona runner-up placing enables Andy Murray to recapture fourth spot, while Rafael Nadal made the most of a shift in the calendar to win his sixth title at the event just one

week after winning his seventh consecutive Monte Carlo 1000. Novak Djokovic remains in the hunt to challenge for the #1 spot in the coming weeks, winning the Masters 1000 event in Miami and his home event in Belgrade since our last update, and is still unbeaten in 2011.

There are no major changes to the women's rankings this month, though Victoria Azarenka's back-to-back titles in Miami and Marbella see her reclaim fifth spot.


